MANSLAUGHTER JURY, UNABLE TO AGREE IN DENNERY CASE, QUILTS

Court Discharges Jury Unable to Reach Agreement After 20 Hours' Deliberation in Case Involving Policeman's Death — Porter Changes Plea

Unable to reach an agreement after 20 hours deliberation the Dennerly manslaughter jury was discharged at 10:30 A. M. today by Judge Austin H. Swackhammer.

The jury was hopelessly deadlocked McClellan, patron of Franklin Township the foreman informed the court this morning when they were brought in before Judge Swackhammer.

"Does that mean you are unable to agree?" The Judge asked.

"Well, there's half for it and that's the way it is" was Patton's reply. This was taken to indicate that the jury was standing six to six although earlier reports said the jury vote should be 8 to 4 for conviction.

No decision has been reached on whether Dennerly would be tried again next fall although it was indicated by Assistant Prosecutor Lawrence Meyers that another trial was probable.

Trial of J. Lewis Dennerly on the manslaughter charge based on the death of Charles Duer a Westville policeman on January 31 was started on Monday. The case was concluded yesterday afternoon and went to the jury at 2:30 o'clock.

When they were unable to reach a verdict by eleven o'clock they were locked in the main courtroom for the night and their deliberation continued throughout most of the night.

The party, a woman, two children and three men, was transferred to eastward cutter No. 103. Those rescued are believed to be Philadelphia men, as the disabled vessel, the "Bob White," is the property of a Philadelphia man.

The victims set out from Bowers Beach yesterday morning on a fishing cruise. The motor broke down and the craft was drifting out to sea when taken in tow by the Commercial Quaker and the coast guard cutter.

The all Bowers Beach this morning the cutter and her tow grounded and fishermen were summoned in aiding the stranded vessel.

Patton filed a \$1000 bond as receiver.
